In order to complete the online application, the following information will be required.

## 1. Academic Information

- Name of the B.C. Post-secondary institution where you will be doing your degree at.
- **Degree program:** Master's or PhD.

## 2. Together for Wildlife Priority Research Areas (not scored)

- Please select the Together for Wildlife themes that are most applicable to your research areas: Reconciliation and Collaboration, Terrestrial Ecosystems, Stewardship and Management, Wildlife and Wildlife Habitat.

## 3. Summary of Research

- Provide a lay summary of your research to be used for communicating with the public (max 250 words).
- Provide some background information to understand the scope of the management problem to be addressed **with appropriate literature cited**.
- What are your research questions(s)?

## 4. Methodologies, Data and Risks

- Outline your proposed research methods including a timeline of key activities and data sources.
- Describe how your data will be shared and managed, including analyses, during and following your research project.
- Describe any potential risks in conducting or completing your research project and any mitigation strategies.

## 5. Contribution to Wildlife Science

- How does your research support the goals of Together For Wildlife?
- How will your project findings contribute to practical solutions?
- How will this early career experience contribute to science, stewardship, management, policy, or decision making of wildlife in British Columbia?

## 6. Communication & Collaboration

- How will you share your research results and communicate your findings with British Columbians?

***Note: If an exception must be applied to open data, such as sensitive community or species data, a clear justification and rationale should be provided.***

- If you are working with a First Nations community, identify how you will share results and data back with the community in a manner that is appropriate and considers First Nations Principles of Ownership Control Access and Possession (OCAP). (Not scored)
- How will receiving this grant support fostering diversity, building Indigenous capacity, and/or advancing reconciliation efforts?

## 7. Research Project Budget

- Outline your overall research project stipend, site and project costs. (Not scored)
- Are there in-kind or matched funds to support this research project? (Not scored)

- Please share anything else about your community and your interest in doing this research which you feel may be important to adjudication (optional).
